#### What is Infection Control?

Using infection prevention and control (IPC) practices in all of the care we provide to our patients and residents minimizes the risk that they will develop an infection. Preventing infections is everyone's responsibility. Elements of good infection prevention and control practices include:

- 1) Frequent hand cleaning (using soap and water or alcohol-based hand rub)
- 2) Cover your cough or sneeze (cough or sneeze into a tissue or your upper arm)
- 3) Keep your immunizations up to date and get a flu shot every fall
- 4) Stay home when you are ill, especially if you have a fever, cough, nausea/ vomiting, or diarrhea
- 5) Be alert for possible outbreaks of infectious illness and act early

- Hand hygiene compliance
